

CURRICULUM CORNER

The Utica City School District's Office of Curriculum and Instruction has been very busy since the opening of the new school year providing guidance and support to our principals and teachers in order to meet the diverse needs of our students. At K-8 level, the school district is fully aligned to the Next Generation Learning Standards (NGLS) as required by the New York State Education Department. The New York State Grades 3-8 Assessment program is also aligned with these new standards. The high school continues its curriculum alignment with these new standards, which the New York State Regents Examinations will be based on as new exams are released over the next few years, beginning with Algebra in June 2024. While different courses use different standards to provide a focus for which topics and skills students need to learn, each course taught in the Utica City School District is built around the specific set of standards that the New York State Education Department requires for that course.

To help our teachers and students shift to the Next Generation Learning Standards, the district has been working to find the best materials for use in the classroom. The district continues to examine and implement the Science of Reading, a collection of research that explains how students learn to read and recommends strategies for helping them improve. This fall, teachers began using new English Language Arts textbooks in Kindergarten through Grade 6 which make use of this important research to help students grow as readers. The district is currently reviewing options for a new Math textbook series for Grades K-6 to enhance the current mathematics program.

Proctor High School is pleased to begin offering PreAP courses in 9th and 10th grade in English and Social Studies. These courses will provide students with great opportunities to challenge themselves and to prepare for the Advanced Placement classes that can earn them college credit in 11th and 12th grade. Currently, Proctor High School offers over 30 Advanced Placement and dual credit college courses through partnership agreements with multiple post-secondary institutions which award college credit to students.

The middle schools and high school are also piloting the ATLAS curriculum planning platform. This is a great program that stores digital copies of each courses' curriculum map Online and makes them available to every teacher in the district. This provides teachers with the ability to see how student expectations change between grade levels. It also gives teachers in every course the ability to see where they can make connections between their curriculum and other courses their students are taking in order to plan cross-curricular interdisciplinary lessons. Once completed, the ATLAS platform will go live, offering access for parents so that families at home can see what students are learning in each class throughout the school year.

The Utica City School District is dedicated to the success of all students. The federal Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) requires states to annually administer tests in English Language Arts (ELA) and Mathematics in Grades 3-8 to a minimum of 95% of students. This is accomplished through the New York State Testing Program in Grades 3-8. The New York State Testing Program has been designed to measure student knowledge and skills as defined by the grade level New York State Next Generation Learning Standards (NGLS) in ELA, Mathematics and Science. Student performance data from the state tests provides important opportunities for teachers to examine learning gaps in order to make instructional decisions for their classrooms and for individual students, thus helping students to better perform academically. As such, the school district strongly encourages all students to participate in the annual Grade 3-8 assessments at their schools.

Over the past couple of years, the New York State Education Department has made adjustments to the Grade 3-8 assessments in order to help students become more comfortable with testing. For example, the assessments are no longer timed, which helps to reduce any anxiety a student may face. Finally, the New York State Education Department is requiring that all schools in the state transition all of the Grade 3-8 assessments to computer based tests. Computer based testing (CBT) was introduced in several of the Utica Elementary buildings during the 2022-2023 school year with great success. The Utica City School District will be fully implementing Computer Based Testing in Grades 3-8 during the 2023-2024 school year, thus meeting the state requirement. Make-ups for all tests will follow the initial administration date. Please reach out to your child's teacher, building principal with questions or concerns about this year's tests. While the district is proud of the overall 96% participation rate for the ELA and 95% participation rate for Math, we are striving for all students to participate. 

The ABCs of STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) Student of the Week Program was created to bring STEM to life at home and encourage students to share their school experiences with their families. The ABCs of STEM kits are being dispersed to the 10 elementary schools this week. The kits include a variety of STEM materials students will use throughout the week such as flashcards, a family activity guide, and much more. This program exposes students at an early age to STEM-related topics in order to provide a knowledge base about STEM for students in grades K-6.

Coding Carts created by Tech4Kidz are rolling into all elementary and middle schools. The carts are created for students in grades K-2, 3-6, and 7 & 8. Included in the carts are: Lego Robotics, Scratch, Binary Bracelets, Dash Robots and Makey Makey Invention kits. Professional development and lesson plans are provided to all staff in order to expose students to the world of coding. Middle School Modules are being designed for the Family & Consumer Science Teachers and Technology Teachers. The ten week modules take a dive into agri-tech and health professions in 7th grade. The skilled trades, advanced manufacturing, and robotics are the focus in 8th grade. Project Based Learning modules allow students an opportunity to develop knowledge through engaging projects. Modules will also connect students to community agencies, businesses, and a mini career fair. Throughout the modules, employability skills will be emphasized in order to prepare students for the workforce.

Studies estimate that 64% of the US population will have at least one adverse childhood experience (ACE) by the age of 17. Increased exposure to ACEs increases the likelihood of academic difficulties, behavior concerns and social-emotional challenges. The Utica City School District recognizes the impact trauma can have on student achievement and the important obligation schools have to educate children through a trauma-sensitive lens. After an inspiring presentation from Dave Melnick, LICSW, on September 6, 2023, entitled "Transforming Trauma: How Schools Become Healing Places," administrators, teachers, and support staff embarked on a two-month district-wide book study to further educate and enhance trauma informed practices in our schools. The book study, *Trauma-Sensitive Schools*, by Susan E. Craig, provided practical ideas for how to improve students' achievement and overall well-being by implementing a trauma-sensitive approach to instruction. The book study offered clear explanations of the role that childhood adversity and trauma play in determining academic success with a variety of concrete strategies to support student learning and overall school success.



system of Care COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS

The Utica City School District is excited to partner with community agencies to establish a "System of Care" model within the school setting to provide interventions and services to students who may need additional support in achieving school success. Areas of support include academic, social-emotional, behavioral, and attendance. Agency partners work collaboratively with District staff in all thirteen buildings. If a child has been selected to be a recipient of supports from one of these partners, parents/quardians will be contacted to give signed permission. The following are the "System of Care" agency partners and a brief summary of the services they provide. INTEGRATED COMMUNITY ALTERNATIVES NETWORK (ICAN)



ICAN provides an array of custom-tailored support services to meet the needs of Utica City School District students. Services include a comprehensive program providing behavioral and mental health supports within special education classroom settings, student engagement specialists in all thirteen buildings providing supports and interventions to meet the needs of identified students, the ability to access the ICAN network of providers through their Independent Practice Association (IPA) services; and customized training for staff, students and parents. All programs utilize evidence-based principles and are centered around a core philosophy of Wraparound care.

SAFE SCHOOLS MOHAWK VALLEY



Safe Schools Mohawk Valley provides support services to identified students in all thirteen buildings. Interventions target improved school attendance, increased school engagement, decreased negative behavior and increased social and emotional strengths. Referrals come from school staff. Safe Schools helps to eliminate barriers to school attendance, helps students struggling in the classroom to be more actively involved in their education, manage emotions and use coping skills to improve behavior. Safe Schools also provides supports to students identified as temporarily without housing.

YOUNG SCHOLARS LIBERTY PARTNERSHIPS PROGRAM (YSLPP)



Young Scholars Liberty Partnerships Program (YSLPP) is a multi-year collaborative program, established in 1993 with Utica University and the Utica City School District (UCSD). This program is designed by education professionals to motivate diverse and talented students with potential to stay in school, earn a New York State Regents Diploma with Advanced Designation, and graduate college and career ready. From entering in grade seven, until graduation, Young Scholars students participate in a year-round comprehensive program providing academic, social, and cultural enrichment.

HILLSIDE WORK-SCHOLARSHIP CONNECTION (HW-SC)



Hillside Work-Scholarship Connection (HW-SC) is a nationally-recognized youth development program that helps at-risk secondary school students stay in school and earn their high school diploma, while providing invaluable part-time work experience and job skills to help prepare them for life after graduation. Full-time, professional Youth Advocates provide long-term mentoring and connect students to a 360-degree web of individualized support. HW-SC empowers students with the skills and confidence they need to realize their dreams of success at school, at home, and on the job.

ON POINT FOR COLLEGE



On Point for College is a nationally-recognized college attainment program. It was founded in 1999 to help ond int first-generation students gain access to college. In the years since, it has expanded its offerings to include college success (completion) support, FAFSA informational sessions, career planning and placement support, and most recently, support with non-college post-secondary credential attainment. On Point services are free and available to students of all ages, backgrounds, and educational levels. On Point specializes in helping high school students and recent graduates, as well as those who have been away from school for a while or who have earned GED or HSE credentials.

HMJ CONSULTING



HMJ Consulting has partnered with the Utica City School District to support student college and career readiness along with community engagement. Their E.A.T.S. services connect students with inspiring alumni, personalized college coaching, extracurricular strategies and additional digital resources. HMJ Consulting community engagement work includes informative workshops for students and families, community resource fairs, a handy directory of local opportunities, and an innovative online portal for easy access. HMJ Consulting is working to empower students on their path to success, support families, and enhance the connection between schools and the community.
